We use modal verbs **must**, **have to** and **should** to talk about obligations (things that must be done).

You **must** brush your teeth twice a day.

I **should** finish my homework before dinner.

Negative Modals

We use modal verbs **mustn't** and **shouldn't** to talk about prohibitions (things that are not allowed).

Drivers mustn't use their phones while driving.

I **shouldn't** bite my fingernails.


The Pitch
