

Types of Conflict

- **Internal Conflict:** This is a struggle that occurs within a character's mind. It involves the battle between opposing desires, emotions, or beliefs within the same individual.



Example: A character torn between pursuing their passion for art and meeting their family's expectations by choosing a more stable career.

- **External Conflict:** This conflict occurs between a character and an external force, which can be another character, society, nature, or technology.

- **Person vs Person:** This conflict involves the protagonist in direct opposition to another character or characters.



Example: Harry Potter vs. Lord Voldemort.

- **Person vs Self:** This conflict involves the protagonist struggling with their own thoughts, emotions, decisions, or inner turmoil.

Example: A character has to choose between leaving home for a dream job or staying home to care for their family.

- **Person vs Nature:** This conflict involves a character struggling against the forces of nature, such as weather, animals, or any natural environment.

Example: "The Revenant," where the main character, Hugh Glass, fights to survive in the harsh, unforgiving wilderness.



- **Person vs Technology:** This conflict involves a character struggling against man-made creations, technological advancements, or the dehumanizing effects of technology. *Example:* In "The Matrix," humans fighting against the machines that have enslaved them.

- **Person vs Supernatural:** This conflict involves a character struggling against supernatural elements, such as ghosts, monsters, or magical occurrences.

Example: Buffy the Vampire Slayer fighting various supernatural entities like vampires, demons, and otherworldly forces.



- **Person vs Society:** This conflict involves a character in conflict with the values, laws, or beliefs of a larger group, society, or culture.

Example: In "To Kill a Mockingbird," Atticus Finch standing up against racial prejudice and a biased legal system in a small Southern town.

Each type of conflict adds depth and tension to a story, shaping the character's journey and their development throughout the narrative.
