[to have respect and admiration for someone]



We're bringing up our children to work hard at school.

to bring up someone / bring someone up

[to care for a child and teach them how to behave]



I hope my grandson will grow up to enjoy books.

Sadie takes after her mother.

They are both very kind.

to take after someone

**[to have characteristics** 

of a parent or relative

to grow up

[to develop from a child to an adult]



Jo gets along with her boss.

to get along / get on with someone

[to have a good relationship with someone



My siblings are always falling out with each other.

to fall out with someone

[to stop being friends with someone, often after an argument]



I fell in love with him while we were backpacking in India.

to fall in love with someone

[to begin to love someone]



We broke up because I didn't love him any more.

to break up with someone [to end a romantic relationship]



They stopped working together last year, so they have drifted apart.

to drift apart

[to slowly become less friendly or close to someone



I made friends with Miguel after he moved to my town.

to make friends with someone [to become friendly with a person]



We've been close friends since we shared an apartment.

a close friend

[a friend who you know very well]

Everyone says how much my wife and I have in common.

to have something in common

[to share an interest or opinion]



My cousin gave birth to a baby boy last year.

to give birth to someone

[to have a child]



We see eye to eye about most important issues.

to see eye to eye with someone

[to agree with or have similar opinions to someone]



We often bump into Mary at the local store.

to bump into someone

[to meet someone unexpectedly]



I stick up for my friends if people are mean to them.

to stick up for someone

[to speak out in support of someone]



My sisters and I all have curly hair. It runs in the family.

to run in the family

[to be a common feature of a family]



Jared was really friendly, and I clicked with him immediately.

to click with someone

[to like someone quickly and easily]

I always put my foot down if my son is naughty.

to put your foot down

[to be strict about something]



I love playing with my grandson. I think the world of him.

to think the world of someone

[to have a very high opinion of someone]
