Context Clues: General Reasoning

Often you will find that a word's context clues don't fall into a particular category. You can still use your knowledge of words and language to get a good idea of an unfamiliar word's meaning.

For example: The basketball <u>ricocheted</u> off the backboard, and I grabbed it before it hit the floor.

Because the game of basketball and the function of a backboard are familiar to you, you would know that *ricocheted* means "bounced." Many times, context clues help you use what you do know to figure out what you don't know.
