Using appositives is a great way to add extra information to a sentence without ruining its structure.

Activity One

When you use an appositive that is essential to understanding the sentence, it is called a **restrictive appositive**. Restrictive appositives **do not need commas**.

Activity Two

Appositives that simply give bonus information in a sentence is called a **non-restrictive appositive**. The sentence still makes sense even when the appositive is removed. Non-restrictive appositives need a comma depending on where the appositive appears in the sentence.

A non-restrictive appositive at the **beginning** of a sentence needs a comma **after** it.

A non-restrictive appositive in the middle of a sentence needs a comma either side.

A non-restrictive appositive at the end of a sentence needs a comma before it.
