Conjunctions (also called joining words) join words, phrases, or sentences together.

Common conjunctions include: and, or, but, because, and so.

Examples

- My parents and I will go to the zoo.
- We will go on Saturday or Sunday.
- Mia wants to come but she has homework.
- I can go because I have finished my homework.
- We are going soon so I will get ready.

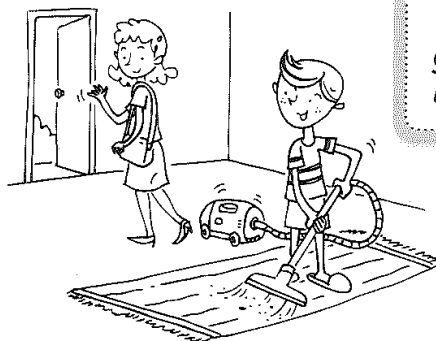
